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INTRODUCTION

The idea of compiling a genealogy of our branch of the Brown family came to me a number of years ago. Unfortunately I did not become interested until most of the older members of the family had died. As a result much information that I could have had for the asking has had to be dug out of the records.

The beginning point of my researches was the entry in the Brown Family Bible showing my great grandfather Isaac Brown to have been born in Preston, Connecticut June 20, 1795 and his wife Eliza Burdick having been born there July 8, 1801. This led me to the Preston Vital Records, which gave the name of Isaac's father as Pardon Brown, whose record in turn led me to his father Walter, and so on back.

Having established the Brown line back to Thomas, Sr., the immigrant ancestor, I decided to augment the study by including the ancestry of the various husbands and wives of Brown Family members in the direct line. This took considerable time and effort, but resulted in a more complete record.

This genealogy does not pretend to be a work of scholarship, but was prepared for my own enjoyment and for the benefit of my children and other members of the family. While a certain amount of original research was involved, I relied heavily on published genealogies, particularly the Brown Genealogy, Volumes 1 and 2, by Cyrus Henry Brown.

One of the side benefits which resulted from this study was to have made the acquaintance of three Van Alstine cousins--Frank, J. Neil and Lester--

and their wives, who I had not previously met. We met once in Salem, Wisconsin at the home of Lester Van Alstine and again in Winona, Minnesota at the home of Dr. Frank Van Alstine.

Prior to the adoption of the Gregorian calendar by England and her colonies in 1752, the new year began generally on March 25. During January, February and most of March the previous year's date was used. For example, Thomas Brown, Jr. and Hannah Collins were married February 8, 1677 (Page 3). Correctly under the old calendar this would have been written 1676 or later 1676/77. In order to avoid confusion I have calculated all dates by the new calendar.

1. THOMAS BROWN(E) was born in England about 1628 according to his deposition taken July 11, 1668 (Essex County, Mass. Court Papers, Vol. XIII, Page 62). He died at Lynn, Massachusetts, August 28, 1693 (Lynn V.R. Vol. 2, Page 443). He married, about 1652 at Lynn, Mary Newhall, daughter of Thomas Newhall and Mary _____, born Lynn about 1637 according to her deposition also taken July 11, 1668. The date and place of her death is not recorded. For brief notes on the Newhall family see Appendix A.

The ancestry of Thomas Brown(e) is not known. Some authorities, including Lewis & Newhall at Page 119 of their "History of Lynn" state that he was the son of Nicholas Brown who came to Lynn about 1630 from Inkburrow, Worcestershire, England. Other authorities, including Savage at Vol. 1, Page 276, state that Thomas was probably not the son of Nicholas, basing this opinion partly on the fact that he was not mentioned in Nicholas' will. Cyrus Henry Brown, author of The Brown Genealogy, stated in Volume 1 that Thomas was the son of Nicholas, while in Volume 2, published about eight years later, he states that he had come to the conclusion that he was not.

After considerable research it has been impossible for me to ascertain the county or parish in England where Thomas Brown(e) was born or the names of his parents (if he was not a son of Nicholas). Neither have I been able to ascertain the date of his arrival in Lynn or the name of the ship on which he sailed from England. Actually very little is known about him prior to his marriage to Mary Newhall.

Thomas Brown(e) was a dish turner. In June, 1663, he bought a house and six acres of land in Lynn from William Longley (Newhall Family of Lynn, Page 16).

According to the records of Essex County Quarterly Courts, Volume III, Page 258, he served as a Constable of Lynn in 1666. The records of the Quarterly Courts show a number of instances where Thomas Brown(e) served as a juror or as a member of a court of inquest. He was a member of the Train Band (militia) of Lynn. His will was admitted to probate October 9, 1693, and his widow Mary and son Ebenezer were appointed executors. He mentions his wife Mary, his sons Ebenezer, Thomas, Joseph, John, and Daniel, also his daughter Mary Norwood. His estate was appraised at 168 pounds, 5 shillings, 8 pence.

Thomas Brown(e) of Lynn has sometimes been confused with a Thomas Brown of Newbury who came to Massachusetts in 1635 on the ship "James" and who is said by Pope, Page 74, to have married a Mary Newhall. Research has convinced me that Thomas Brown of Newbury and Thomas Brown(e) of Lynn were two different persons and that if the former also married a Mary Newhall, which is questionable, it was a coincidence in names.

Thomas Brown(e) and Mary Newhall had 15 children, all born in Lynn. (Source: Brown Genealogy)

(2) THOMAS BROWN, JR., son of Thomas Brown(e) and Mary Newhall, was born at Lynn, Massachusetts, about 1654 and died at Stonington, Connecticut, December 27, 1723. (Brown Genealogy, Vol. 2, Page 17.) He is interred at the Cedar Swamp Burying Ground, but his grave is unmarked. (Same.) He married, February 8, 1677, at Lynn, Hannah Collins (Lynn V.R. Vol. 2, Page 71), daughter of Henry Collins, Jr. and Mary _____, born Lynn December, 1659. (Lynn V.R. Vol. 1, Page 113.) The date and place of her death are not known. For notes on the ancestry of Hannah Collins see Appendix B.

After his marriage, Thomas Brown, Jr. removed to Stonington, Connecticut, along with his brothers John and Eleazer. They took up a large tract of land in the northern portion of the town along what later became the Providence-New London Turnpike (State Route 184). John Brown's lands lay in the westerly portion of the tract

and Eleazer Brown's in the eastern portion. Thomas Brown's lands were in the middle and were located along what is now Anquilla Road southeast of North Stonington post office. (Brown Genealogy, Vol. 2, Pages 16 and 17.) Thomas Brown, Jr. was a joiner by trade, but was also a farmer. He apparently dropped the final "e" from his surname.

The date of Thomas Brown, Jr.'s move to Stonington is difficult to ascertain. The births of several of his children are listed in the Stonington Vital Records (Vol. 2, Page 45), and if they were in fact born there he would have arrived in Stonington by 1678. However, the births of Samuel, Hannah, Mary and Sarah are also recorded in the Lynn Vital Records (Vol. 1, Pages 77, 79 and 80), which would indicate that they might have been born there. In any event it can be said with some certainty that Thomas Brown, Jr. settled in Stonington no later than 1688.

Thomas Brown, Jr. evidently prospered since the records of the town of Stonington show that he purchased additional lands from time to time. On November 13, 1714, he purchased 50 acres of land from Samuel Allin for a price of 150 pounds (Stonington Records, Vol. 2 Deeds, Page 535.) On January 25, 1722, he deeded a tract of land about a mile from his homestead to his son Daniel. This deed was given shortly after the birth of Daniel's first child.

Thomas Brown, Jr. and Hannah Collins had 10 children, the last six born certainly in Stonington, the first four in either Lynn or Stonington. (Sources: Brown Genealogy, Vol. 2, Page 17, History of Stonington, Pages 259 and 260, Lynn V.R. Vol. 1, Pages 77, 79 and 80, Stonington V.R., Vol. 2, Page 45.)

(24.) DANIEL BROWN, son of Thomas Brown, Jr. and Hannah Collins, was born at Stonington, Connecticut, October 9, 1696 (Stonington V.R., Vol. 2, Page 45). He was baptized May 23, 1697 (History of First Congregational Church of Stonington, Page 201). He died Stonington August 30, 1771 (per grave stone) and is interred in what is known as the Breed-Brown Cemetery on Sleepy Hollow Road in the Town of North Stonington, now designated by the town as Private Cemetery No. 31. The marker is legible. He married (1) at Stonington, June 21, 1721, Mary Breed (Stonington V.R., Vol. 2, Page 18), daughter of John Breed and Mercy Palmer, born January 8, 1697 (Brown Genealogy, Vol. 2, Page 98), died at Stonington 1744 (per grave stone). She is also interred in the Breed-Brown Cemetery. The officiant at the marriage was Rev. Hezekiah Lord, long time pastor of the Congregational Church of Preston. He married (2) at Stonington,

Prudence _____, born about 1699, died December 2, 1768 (per grave stone). For the ancestry of Mary Breed see Appendix C.

Daniel Brown resided for many years on a tract of land located along the New London-Providence Turnpike deeded to him by his father Thomas Brown, Jr. shortly after the birth of Daniel's first child. This was probably part of the original Thomas Brown tract. In later years he moved several miles north to property on Voluntown Road in order to be near his son Christopher. The Breed-Brown Cemetery is located on a portion of the Christopher Brown property.

Daniel Brown served 18 terms as a Selectman of Stonington (History of Stonington, pages 168 and 169). He was Captain of the Stonington Train Band (militia). He donated a portion of the land for the first Baptist Church of North Stonington on Pendleton Hill. He was not a Baptist, but his wife's cousin, Elder Waite Palmer, was the first minister of this church. His grave stone reads as follows: "In memory of Capt. Daniel Brown who departed this life Augt. 30, 1771, in the 75th year of his age."

Daniel Brown's will was dated January 17, 1770, and disposes of his assets to his children. Interestingly enough, among the assets was a Negro girl named Chillis who he gave to his son Nehemiah and a Negro girl named Jennie who he gave to his son Christopher.

Daniel Brown and Mary Breed had the following children, all born in Stonington. No children by second wife. (Sources: Brown Genealogy; Stonington V.R. Vol. 2, page 18; History of Stonington.)

(29) WALTER BROWN, son of Daniel Brown and Mary Breed, born Stonington, Connecticut, February 1, 1728 (Stonington V.R. Vol. 2, page 18), died probably Preston, Connecticut, September 14, 1808 (per grave stone), interred Brown Cemetery located on a farm off Brand Road in the eastern portion of the Town of Preston designated as Cemetery No. 12. Stone is legible. Married (1) at Little Compton, Rhode Island, January 3, 1754, by Rev. Jonathan Ellis, Elizabeth Wilbur (Wilbore) (Stonington V.R. Vol. 3, page 182), daughter of William Wilbur (Wilbore) and Jane Crandall born Little Compton, Rhode Island, March 17, 1730 (Little Compton Families, page 711), died June 15, 1768 (per grave stone), interred in Breed-Brown Cemetery, North Stonington, Connecticut. Married (2) probably at Preston, January 13, 1773, Mary (Frink ?) born 1734, died March 16, 1795 (per grave stone), interred Brown Cemetery, Preston, Connecticut. For the ancestry of Elizabeth Wilbur see Appendix D.

Walter Brown lived in Stonington or North Stonington until the death of his wife Elizabeth. All of his children by that marriage were born there and their births are recorded in the Stonington Vital Records. At about the time of his second marriage he removed to Preston and the births of the four children of this marriage are recorded in the Preston Vital Records.

The Brown Cemetery in the Town of Preston (Cemetery No. 12) is located in a grove on a working farm. It is not fenced off and the farm animals have free run of the burial plots. In this cemetery are buried Walter Brown, his wife Mary, his children Elizabeth, Walter, and Pardon, his brothers Amos and Nathan, their wives and some of their children. Most of the stones are legible. Walter Brown's grave stone reads as follows: "In memory of Mr. Walter Brown who died Sept. 14, 1808, in the 80th year of his age."

Walter Brown was a veteran of the Revolution, having served in Capt. Eleazer Prentice's company, Col. McClellan's regiment, Connecticut Militia, from September 25, 1782, to November 23, 1782 (Record of Connecticut Men in War of Revolution, War of 1812, and Mexican War, page 587; Also DAR Lineage Book, 1909, Vol. 73, page 154.)

Walter Brown and Elizabeth Wilbur (Wilbore) had the following children, all born in Stonington (Sources: Brown Genealogy Vol. 2, page 155; Stonington V.R. Vol. 3, page 182.)

(41) PARDON BROWN, son of Walter Brown and Elizabeth Wilbur, born Stonington, Connecticut, March 6, 1768 (Stonington V.R. Vol. 3, page 182), died Preston or Griswold, Connecticut, October 22, 1820 (per grave stone). He is interred in the Brown Cemetery located off Brand Road in the eastern part of the Town of Preston designated as Cemetery No. 12. The marker is legible. He married, August 7, 1791, at Preston, Connecticut, Dorothy Culver (Preston V.R. Vol. 2, page 227), daughter of Jeremiah Culver and Dorothy _____, born Preston, Connecticut, November 15, 1770 (Preston V.R. Vol. 2, page 53), although the record of her marriage to Pardon Brown shows that she was then of Stonington. I have been unable to learn the date and place of her death, although the Griswold Vital Records show a Dorothy Brown married to Samuel Kinny April 24, 1826, so it is possible that she re-married after the death of Pardon. Pardon Brown's grave stone reads as follows: " Pardon Brown died October 22, 1820, in the 53rd year of his age. Whom have I in heaven but Thee and there is none upon earth that I desire beside Thee." For Dorothy Culver's ancestry see Appendix E.

Pardon Brown lived at Stonington with his father Walter until the latter's remarriage, at which time the family removed to Preston. He was of Preston at the time of his marriage to Dorothy Culver and at the time of the birth of all of his children. I suspect that after his marriage he lived in that portion of the Town of Preston set off in 1815 as the Town of Griswold since three of his children, Patty, Lydia, and Isaac, attended school in the 8th District during the winter of 1798/9 (History of Griswold, page 358). The 8th District is in that portion of Preston which later became Griswold, so presumably he lived in

that area. District 8 is located in the extreme southeast portion of the town. He is, however, buried in the old Town of Preston.

Pardon Brown and Dorothy Culver had the following children, all born in Preston (Preston V.R. Vol. 2, page 227).

(48) ISAAC BROWN, son of Pardon Brown and Dorothy Culver, was born in Preston, Connecticut, on June 19, 1795 (Preston V.R. Vol. 2, page 227; Brown Family Bible gives date of birth as June 20, 1795.) He died Salem, Wisconsin, December 18, 1870 (Brown Family Bible and gravestone), and is interred in Liberty Cemetery south of Salem, Wisconsin. The marker is legible. He married (1) at Griswold, Connecticut, November 22, 1818, Eliza Burdick (Preston V.R. Vol. 2, page 290; Brown Family Bible), daughter of Joshua Burdick and Katurah Hill, born Preston, Connecticut July 8, 1801 (Brown Family Bible). Died Salem, Wisconsin, March 28, 1864 (Brown Family Bible and grave stone).

Interred in Liberty Cemetery. The marker is legible. He married (2) at Salem, Wisconsin, September 2, 1867, Phebe Ann (Preston?) (Brown Family Bible). I have been unable to ascertain the date and place of her death. No children were born of this marriage. For the ancestry of Eliza Burdick see Appendix F.

After his marriage, Isaac Brown first lived in that portion of the town of Preston which in 1815 was set off as Griswold. His first three children were born there. About 1826 he removed to Plainfield, Connecticut, and his next two children were born there. About 1830 he removed to Bridgewater, Oneida County, New York, where he took up land. He lived in the Bridgewater-Winfield, New York area until about 1843, and his last four children were born there. About 1843 he removed to Salem, then Racine now Kenosha County, Wisconsin, where he patented a tract of land from the Government.

Isaac Brown was one of the pioneer farmers of Wisconsin Territory and his farm was one of the most fertile in the area. At his death it was divided between his two surviving sons, Henry Tyler Brown and Joseph Minor Brown. The farm is still in the family, being now owned by Mrs. Helen Brown Bushing, a great granddaughter. It has been designated as a Centennial Farm.

Isaac Brown was a charter member of Washburn Lodge No. 145 Free and Accepted Masons, Bristol, Wisconsin.

Isaac Brown and Eliza Burdick had the following children, born variously in Connecticut, New York, and Wisconsin. (Sources: Brown Family Bible; Van Alstyne Family Bible, and correspondence with Helen Brown Bushing.)

Cull and Harriet _____, born Salem, Wisconsin, September 17, 1862, died Salem, Wisconsin July 16, 1940, interred Liberty Cemetery. Ira David Brown and Anna Cull had the following children, all born in Salem, Wisconsin. (Sources: Brown Family Bible and correspondence with Helen Brown Bushing.)

Arthur Brown (who later adopted the middle initial "I") operated the family farm in Salem Township, Kenosha County, Wisconsin, following the death of his father. Some time prior to 1898 he and his sister sold their half of the original Isaac Brown farm to his cousin Ira D. Brown, who had inherited the other half. Arthur Brown worked in Chicago for a short time and then came to South Haven, Michigan, where he met and married Mary McEwing.

In the year 1900 he bought stock in a newly organized cannery in South Haven, Michigan, known as South Haven Preserving Company, of which he became an officer and director. The Company purchased a cannery in Gobles, Michigan, in the early 1900's and Arthur Brown managed this operation for many years. He was admitted to the Michigan Bar in 1931 and worked for a law firm in Chicago for a year. In 1932 he established his law practice in St. Joseph, Michigan and practiced there for 15 years. During the last year he was associated with Arthur G. Preston, Jr. in the law firm of Brown & Preston.

He was elected a director and officer of Michigan Fruit Canners, Inc. in 1936, and in 1947 became associated with this company on a full time basis

as vice-president and treasurer. In 1958 he was elected president of the company and in 1968 chairman of the board.

In 1962 Michigan Fruit Canners, Inc. was acquired by Consolidated Foods Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, by an exchange of stock, and in that year he became a director of Consolidated Foods Corporation and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1973.

He received 200 acres in the division of lands at Lynn in 1638. He removed to Long Island but later returned to Lynn. Allen Breed and his wife Elizabeth had at least four children--Allen, Timothy, Joseph, and John ("History of Lynn,"Page 115).

(151) Allen Breed, Jr., born England 1626, died Lynn date unknown, married date and place unknown Mary _____. The date and place of her birth and death are unknown ("History of Stonington", Page 244).

Allen Breed, Jr. and his wife Mary had six children, all born in Lynn, one of whom was John.

(152) John Breed, born Lynn January 18, 1663, died Stonington, Connecticut 1761 ("History of Stonington", Page 244), married (1) at Lynn April 28, 1686, Mary Kirtland, married (2) at Stonington, Connecticut June 8, 1690, Mercy Palmer born Stonington 1668, died Stonington January 28, 1752 ("History of Stonington", Pages 244 and 510).

John Breed resided in Lynn until the death of his first wife and child in 1688 and then removed to Stonington where he purchased land from Deacon Gershom

Palmer, his second wife's father. He built his house at Anquilla about a mile south of Thomas Brown's farm. He served two terms as a representative to the General Court. He and his wife Mercy were members of the First Congregational Church of Stonington and are interred at Wequetequock Cemetery ("History of Stonington", Pages 161 and 244).

ANCESTRY OF MERCY PALMER

They landed at Salem, Massachusetts and soon thereafter settled at Charlestown, Massachusetts, where it is claimed that he built the first dwelling house. He was admitted as a freeman May 18, 1631.

He resided in Charlestown until 1643 when he removed to Rehoboth in Plymouth Colony.

He became a representative to the General Court of Plymouth Colony and served as a selectman of Rehoboth. In 1653 he removed to Stonington, Connecticut where he resided until his death November 10, 1661. Walter Palmer was married twice. The name of his first wife is unknown. He married as his second wife Rebecca Short June 1, 1633, probably at Charlestown. Walter Palmer had five children by his first wife and seven by his second wife, the sixth of whom was Gershom ("History of Stonington", Pages 504-508).

(164) Deacon Gershom Palmer, son of Walter Palmer and Rebecca Short, was born in Rehoboth, Massachusetts, date unknown, and came to Stonington with his father in 1653. He died Stonington 1719. He served in the Colonial-Indian Wars of New England. He married (1) at Stonington November 28, 1667, Ann Dennison, daughter of Capt. George Dennison and Ann Borodell. His first wife Ann Dennison died in 1694 and he married (2) at Stonington November 11, 1707, Elizabeth Peck Mason, widow of Major Samuel Mason. APPENDIX G

ANCESTRY OF LEONARD VAN ALSTINE, FATHER OF EVALINE VAN ALSTINE BROWN

(275) Jan Martense Van Alstyne, the immigrant ancestor of many of the Van Alstynes (Van Alstines) in America came from the Netherlands to New Amsterdam (New York) as early as 1652. He was born date unknown probably at Meppel in the province of Drenthe, and may have been the son of Marten Van Alstyne of that place. He died Kinderhook, New York about 1698. He married date unknown, probably in the Netherlands, Dirckje Harmense. He was originally a weaver and in accordance with the custom of the day he was known as "Jan the Weaver", but apparently gave up this occupation for that of a trader and later for farming. He resided in Albany, New York in 1657 where he purchased a lot lying east of Broadway and north of Columbia Street. Some time later in 1686 he purchased a tract of land near Kinderhook, New York which he deeded to his son Abraham in 1695 upon promise of payment of sums of money to the other children. He was one of the founders of the town of Kinderhook. Jan Martense Van Alstyne and Dirckje Harmense had the following children, the first two born in the Netherlands and the last four in New York: Herman born 1650, Abraham born 1652, Martin born 1655, Lambert born 1656, Isaac born 1657, and Dorothea born 1659.

(276) Lambert Janse Van Alstyne, fourth son of Jan Martense, was born Albany in 1656 and died Kinderhook, New York October 16, 1703. He married about 1682 Jannetje Mingael born date and place unknown the daughter of Thomas Janse Mingael and Marritje Abrahamse Vosburgh. She died some time after 1713. About 1684 he took up a tract of land in Kinderhook next to his father's land. Lambert Janse Van Alstyne and Jannetje Mingael had the following children, the first seven of whom were baptized at Kinderhook:

Catherine born about 1683, Marritje baptized December 27, 1685, Thomas baptized August 22, 1688, Johannes baptized August 11, 1691, Dirckje baptized May 26, 1695, Antje baptized January 16, 1698, died young, Annetje baptized July 28, 1700, Pieter baptized August 9, 1702.

(277) Thomas Van Alstyne, third child of Lambert Janse Van Alstyne and Jannetje Mingael, baptized Kinderhook, New York August 22, 1688, died probably Muitzeskill, New York August 1765. He married place unknown December 12, 1718 Maria Van Alen, daughter of William Van Alen and Marritje Van Patten, baptized June 22, 1695. The date and place of her death are unknown. Thomas Van Alstyne came into possession of the homestead farm at Kinderhook on the death of his father. His will dated February 15, 1760 is recorded in the Surrogate's Office at Albany, New York, Vol. 1, Page 239. Thomas Van Alstyne and Maria Van Alen had the following children, all except the fourth baptized at Muitzeskill: Jannetje baptized March 6, 1720, William baptized December 10, 1721, Lambert baptized October 4, 1724, Maria baptized September 10, 1727, died young, Catherine baptized January 17, 1731, Maria baptized November 18, 1733, Pieter, baptized May 16, 1736.

(278) Pieter Van Alstyne, son of Thomas Van Alstyne, was baptized May 16, 1736, at Muitzeskill. The date and place of his death are unknown. He married at Kinderhook September 17, 1760, Marritje Conyn born date and place unknown the daughter of Casperus Conyn and Hendrickje Van Schaick. The date and place of her death are unknown. Following the death of his father in 1765 he came into possession of the 678 acre homestead farm at Kinderhook on condition that he pay his brothers and sisters certain sums of money. In October, 1787 he sold the property to Peter Van Ness and is believed to have removed to Mohawk, New York. Pieter Van Alstyne and Marritje Conyn had the following

children, all baptized in Kinderhook except Pieter who was baptized at Athens, New York: Thomas baptized August 15, 1761, Hendrickje baptized August 20, 1763, Maria baptized August 4, 1765, Eva baptized May 8, 1768, Jannetje baptized August 1, 1770, Alida baptized January 17, 1773, died young, Alida baptized March 13, 1774, Pieter born August 15, 1776, baptized January 21, 1777.

(279) Peter Van Alstine, son of Pieter, was born August 15 (Family Bible says August 16), 1776 and was baptized at the Zion Lutheran Church at Loonenberg (now Athens), New York January 21, 1777. He died Salem, Wisconsin after 1860. He married October 2, 1803, Jane Watson born October 16, 1785 place unknown, daughter of James Watson and wife Mary _____ who came to Skaneateles, New York in 1796. She died Salem, Wisconsin December 9, 1848 and is interred in Liberty Cemetery. Peter Van Alstine apparently dropped the Dutch spelling of "Pieter" and changed the "y" in his surname to an "i". His baptismal record spells the name "Van Alsteen". (NYG & BR Vol. 84, Page 154). Following his marriage Peter took up land near Cato, Cayuga County, New York and he is listed in the 1810 census of Cato. He apparently resided at Cato for at least 20 years, since in the year 1830 a deed given by Peter Van Alstine and Jane his wife describes them as being residents of that town. They may have removed to Hannibal, New York after 1830 and before removing to Wisconsin. In the late 1830's or early 1840's Peter and Jane Van Alstine migrated to Salem, then Racine now Kenosha County, Wisconsin. He is listed in the 1860 census of Salem at age 84 living with his son James W. Van Alstine. He is believed to be buried next to his wife in Liberty Cemetery, but there is no monument marking his grave. Peter Van Alstine and Jane Watson had the following children, all born in New York State:

He married March 4, 1841, at Palmyra, New York Talitha Philena Preston, daughter of Joseph Preston and Nabby Colburn, born March 28, 1818, Rome, New York, died Winona, Minnesota, March 13, 1870. Leonard Van Alstine and his wife lived for a time near Victory and later near Rose, New York. Some time prior to 1843 he removed to

Salem, Wisconsin. Following Leonard Van Alstine's death his widow Talitha married Robert Stanley of Antioch, Illinois, March 18, 1853, and later married Daniel Fay of Winona, Minnesota, July 5, 1866.

APPENDIX I - ANCESTRY OF MARY McEWING AND OTHER McEWING DESCENDANTS

The McEwans derived from the same stock as the McLachlans and McNeills. The ancient seat of the clan McEwan was in the central portion of the district of Cowall, Argyll, Scotland, east of Loch Fyne. As late as 1750 there stood on a rocky point on the coast of Loch Fyne about a mile below the church at Kilfinnan the vestige of a building known as McEwan's Castle. In the 12th century the McEwans, McLachlans, and the Lamonts were in possession of the greater part of Cowall. The Lamonts occupied that portion of the district lying south of the Kilfinnan River, the McEwans occupied the portion lying between Kilfinnan and Strachlachlan, and the McLachlans occupied the area of Strachlachlan. The chiefs of the clan McEwan held the title "Baron of Otter". The ninth and last of the Otter chiefs, Swene, granted a charter of most of the McEwan lands to Duncan Campbell. After Swene's death King James IV confirmed the grant to Archibald Campbell, the Earl of Argyll, who took possession in 1493. Thereafter the McEwans became a broken clan allied with their kinsmen, the McLachlans. Many remained in the vicinity of Kilfinnan, most of them holding their lands as tenants of the Campbells. Part of the clan settled in Dumbartonshire under the Earl of Lennox. One family of McEwans became senechals (major domos or stewards) to the Campbells. It is said that the McEwans became hereditary bards to the Campbells. The name is spelled variously Macewan, McEwan, Macewen, McEwen, Mackeown, Macewing, McEwing.

(325) John McEwan (Mackeown (sic)), fisherman, was baptized at Kilfinnan, Cowall, Argyll, Scotland, either September 6, 1780 or June 5, 1783. The date and place of his death are unknown. For his parentage see note below. He married, date and

place unknown, Mary Smith. The date and place of her birth and death and her parentage are unknown. They had at least one child, John, born Kilfinnan about 1806.

Note: The parish register of Kilfinnan shows the birth of two John McEwans, either of which could have been the John McEwan (325) above. My guess would be the first named.

- (1) "John son to John MacKeown (sic) and Mary Campbell in Kilfinnan was baptized September 6, 1780."
- (2) "John son to John Mackeown (sic) and Anny McLean in Armgadden was baptized at Kilmodan June 5, 1783."

(326) John McEwan (McEwing), born Kilfinnan, Cowall, Argyll, Scotland, about 1806, the son of John McEwan, fisherman, and Mary Smith. He died Glasgow, Scotland, December 16, 1870. He married at Kilfinnan November 15, 1830 Ann McEwen (sic) born Kilfinnan about 1810 daughter of Peter McEwen, fisherman, and Mary McLean. She died Tighnabruaich, Kilfinnan December 25, 1874. John McEwan was the schoolmaster of Strachur, Cowall, Argyll, for nearly 40 years and all of his children were born in Strachur. The school house where he lived and taught is still standing, but is now used as a warehouse. In the Kilfinnan parish entry covering his marriage in 1830 his name was given as McEwen as was his wife's. In the entry covering his death in Glasgow in 1870 his name was given as McEwan. The census of Strachur for 1851 and 1861 gives his name as McEwing. His signature on his son Thomas' apprentice papers gives it as MacEwing. Part of the difference in spelling can, of course, be attributed to the parish registrars and census takers, but it is quite obvious that at some time during his life he changed the spelling of his name to McEwing. His son Thomas also used the McEwing spelling, but his other children continued to use the McEwan style.

John McEwan (McEwing) and his wife Ann McEwen had the following children, all born in Strachur:

- (327) Anne born October 24, 1831, baptized October 31, 1831, married _____ Simpson. Had George born Dunoon about 1857.
- (328) Thomas born April 2, 1833, baptized April 12, 1833, married Elizabeth Davidson. (See Davidson below.)
- (329) Peter born February 26, 1836, baptized February 29, 1836, came to Washington 1885 settled in Snohomish County, died Seattle, Washington July 17, 1918, interred Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. Had John, Thomas, Peter, Alexander, and Margaret.
- (330) Catherine (twin) born January 28, 1838, baptized February 7, 1838, never married.
- (331) Mary (twin) born January 28, 1838, baptized February 7, 1838, died Glasgow, Scotland about 1917, never married.
- (332) John born May 2, 1840, baptized May 14, 1840, married Ellen _____ born Strachlachland about 1846. He was living in Glasgow in 1918. Had Thomas, James, Duncan, and Ellen (married _____ Henderson), also possibly John.

(328) Thomas McEwing born Strachur, Cowall, Argyll, Scotland, April 2, 1833, baptized April 12, 1833, the son of John McEwan (McEwing) and Ann McEwen, died Casco Township north of South Haven, Michigan December 11, 1908, interred Lake View Cemetery, South Haven, Michigan, married Glasgow, Scotland, August 25, 1864, Elizabeth Davidson, daughter of John Davidson and Mary McKellar, born October 9, 1846, at Glasgow, Scotland, died October 24, 1926 at St. Joseph, Michigan, interred Lake View Cemetery, South Haven, Michigan.

Thomas McEwing was a wright and joiner (carpenter) having been apprenticed by his father to Adam Boyd, a master joiner in Glasgow, for five years from and after October 26, 1851. After completing his apprenticeship he worked at his trade in the Glasgow area. After his marriage to Elizabeth Davidson in 1864 the couple left Scotland for Canada

and settled in or near London, Ontario, where their first child was born. Some time prior to 1870 they removed to Detroit, Michigan, where Thomas McEwing continued his trade of carpenter. About 1890, his health being poor, the family purchased a farm in Casco Township, Allegan County, north of South Haven, Michigan, where they resided until Thomas McEwing's death in 1908. Some time after that date his widow Elizabeth sold the farm and in her later years resided with her daughter Mary. Thomas McEwing and Elizabeth Davidson had the following children, the first born London, Ontario, and the last four Detroit, Michigan:

(334) Anna born February 9, 1870, died Detroit, Michigan, November 28, 1940.

(333) John McEwing born March 10, 1866, London, Ontario, Canada, died March 13, 1932 Oakland, California, interred Chapel of Memories; married (1) date and place unknown Alice (Robinson ?) who died without children; married (2) November 27, 1901, at San Francisco, California Alice Eleanor Williams, daughter of John N. Williams and Catherine Van Celius born January 4, 1880, at Oak Grove, Nebraska, died April 30, 1965, Lafayette, California, interred Chapel of Memories, Oakland, California. John McEwing was for many years the general manager of the California Transportation Company which operated a fleet of river steamers plying between San Francisco and Sacramento. He was a 33rd degree Mason and was Director of Work for the Oakland Consistory of the Scottish Rite. John McEwing and Alice Williams had the following children:

(338) Kenneth Davidson born San Francisco, California January 9, 1903.

(339) John Irving born Oakland, California May 1, 1909.

(340) Frances Catherine born Oakland, California March 29, 1914.

(338) Kenneth Davidson McEwing born San Francisco, California January 9, 1903, married Oakland, California June 6, 1925 Minnie Elizabeth Schultz born July 4, 1904 San Francisco, California, daughter of Charles Frederick Schultz and Marie Anna Arnold. Kenneth Davidson McEwing was for many years a banker in Berkeley, California, having been an executive of the American Trust Company and later the Wells-Fargo Bank. He and his wife Minnie are now retired and living in Laguna Hills, California. Kenneth Davidson McEwing and Minnie Elizabeth Schultz had the following children, both born in Oakland, California:

(334) Anna McEwing born Detroit, Michigan February 9, 1870, daughter of Thomas McEwing and Elizabeth Davidson, died Detroit, Michigan November 28, 1940, interred Acacia Park Cemetery, married Casco Township, Allegan County, Michigan April 15, 1891 John C. Lorgion born April 15, 1864 at Toledo, Ohio, son of Charles Lorgion and Sarah Darrah, died April 12, 1948, Detroit, Michigan, interred Acacia Park Cemetery. John C. Lorgion was an engineer. He first worked in the lumber camps in Kentucky and West Virginia. About 1900 he became associated with South Haven Preserving Company and about 1910 removed to Detroit where he became superintendent of the Frederick Stearns & Co. drug manufacturing plant in that city. After his retirement from Stearns he worked as a building inspector for the City of Detroit. John C. Lorgion and Anna McEwing had the following children:

Leslie Berry was a printer, having been for many years an executive of the Saturday Night Press, Detroit, Michigan. No children were born of this marriage.

(335) William McEwing born Detroit, Michigan December 17, 1871, the son of Thomas McEwing and Elizabeth Davidson, died April 7, 1936, South Haven, Michigan, interred Lake View Cemetery, married Bangor, Michigan, December, 1901, Caroline

Leila Cox, born Bangor Michigan, January 22, 1881, daughter of Oliver E. Cox and Delia Flanger, died August 27, 1943, Pasadena, California, interred Lake View Cemetery, South Haven, Michigan. William McEwing worked first in the lumber camps of Kentucky and West Virginia. About 1896, in partnership with Mike Allain, he established the South Haven Preserving Company. Upon its incorporation in 1900 he became President and continued in that position until the merger of the South Haven Preserving Company into Michigan Fruit Cannery. He was President of Michigan Fruit Cannery from the date of the merger until his death. William McEwing and Caroline Leila Cox had the following children, both born in South Haven, Michigan:

(343) Edith McEwing born South Haven, Michigan, September 18, 1903, the daughter of William McEwing and Caroline Leila Cox, married (1) May 7, 1932, Green Bay, Wisconsin, Raphael E. Cote, son of Elzie Cote and Mary _____, divorced November 22, 1941; married (2) _____ at Glendale, California, Thomas Irwin Baker, son of Frank T. Baker and Frances Irwin, died August 25, 1968, Los Angeles, California, interred Westwood Memorial Park, Los Angeles. Thomas Baker, following service in World War II, entered the wholesale drapery firm of Odenheimer and Baker. He continued in that business until his death. Edith McEwing and her first husband, Raphael Cote, had the following child. No children of the second marriage.

Edward C. Shepard was a merchant, senior partner in the firm of Shepard & Benning, St. Joseph,

1914 the Shepard & Benning Store converted from a general dry goods store to a ladies' ready
to wear shop and Catheryne Shepard became the manager, a position she retained until her
retirement in 1939. No children were born of this marriage.

DAVIDSON LINE

The Davidson clan was named for its first chief, David Du of
Inverhaven in the district of Badenoch. According to tradition, the Davidsons were a branch
of the Comyn clan. Their pipe music is "Tulloch's Salute". Following the downfall of the
Comyns in 1308 the then chief, Donald Du, married a daughter of Angus Mackintosh, chief

of the clan Chatten and became a leading member of the clan. The Davidsons have since that time been regarded as a sept of the clan Chattan. The Davidsons participated in two important battles--Invernahaven 1370 and the North Inch of Perth 1397--and lost both battles. In the latter battle the Macphersons and the Davidsons, who had fallen out, each selected thirty warriors to settle the dispute by battle. Robert III, the King of Scotland, was the umpire. After the battle only one Davidson was left alive and the clan has not figured importantly in history since that date. The leading families in modern times are the Davidsons of Cantray and the Davidsons of Tulloch. The Davidsons were the hereditary keepers of the royal castle of Dingwall.

(350) John Davidson, born on the Isle of Man about 1818, son of John Davidson, farmer and Elizabeth Porter. The date and place of his death are not recorded, but he was living in Glasgow in 1884. He probably married (1) on the Isle of Man about 1839 a wife whose name, parentage, and place of birth and death I have been unable to ascertain. One child, John, was born of this marriage. He married (2) December 1, 1843, at St. James Church, Glasgow (see Barony Marriage Records, Page 394), Mary McKellar, daughter of Malcolm McKellar and Janet McKinley, born Lochgoilhead, Argyll, Scotland December 29, 1820. She died probably Glasgow between 1848 and 1851. He married (3) at Glasgow June 9, 1858, Lillies Howie, daughter of John Howie, farmer and Mary Bannerman, born about 1828, died Glasgow August 10, 1884. John Davidson survived her. John Davidson was first a porter and later a messenger for the Royal Bank of Scotland. Following the death of his second wife his three youngest children went to live with their maternal grandparents, the Malcolm McKellars of Lochgoilhead, as shown by the 1851 census. Following his third marriage his daughter Margaret and son William returned to Glasgow and lived with their father and step-mother according to the 1861 census. Elizabeth Davidson, however, remained with her grand-

parents in Lochgoilhead, as also shown by the 1861 census. The record of her marriage to Thomas McEwing in 1864 shows her to be a resident of 4 Royal Bank Place, Glasgow, so apparently she returned to her father prior to that date.

Children by first marriage:

John, born on the Isle of Man about 1840, was living with his father in Glasgow at the time of the census of 1861.

Children by second marriage, all born in Glasgow:

Margaret, born 1845.

Elizabeth, born October 9, 1846, married Thomas McEwing.

William, born about 1848.

I made considerable effort to locate a birth record for John Davidson (350) on the Isle of Man, a certificate covering his first marriage, a record of the birth of his son John, and the birth places and marriage dates of his parents John Davidson, Sr. and Elizabeth Porter, but in spite of diligent searching and professional help was unable to locate any of these records. I also made a considerable effort to ascertain the date and place of death of John Davidson (350), but was likewise unsuccessful. Since Davidson is not a common Manx name, it is thought that the family came originally from Scotland.

I was fortunate, however, in being able to locate the records covering the McKellar family, which apparently was an old family in Lochgoilhead. Malcolm McKellar, Elizabeth Davidson's maternal grandfather, was born there April 6, 1785, the son of Duncan MacKellar (sic). He was a fisherman and a gardener. Malcolm McKellar's wife, Janet McKinley, daughter of the "Widow McKinley", was also born in Lochgoilhead about 1799. They had Mary born 1820 (married John Davidson), Duncan born 1826, Archibald born 1828, John born 1834, Alexander born 1837, and Archibald (again) born 1838. Grandmother apparently was happy living with her grandparents according to the stories she told of her life there. It

is a delightful village located on Loch Goil, an arm of Loch Long. Apparently much of the land in the area was owned by the Campbells and grandmother told of her grandfather and uncles poaching on the lands of the Duke of Argyll, the head of the Campbell clan.

Richard Goodwin, Jr. worked as an agricultural laborer in Washtenaw County until his marriage. Thomas Brookens came to America with his parents when about six years of age, settled in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, and removed to Holmes County, Ohio February, 1817. He purchased a farm of 169 acres where he resided until his death.

Thomas Brookens and Jane Jarvis had at least nine children, one of whom was Joseph.

(400) Samuel Work, born date unknown probably County Antrim, Ireland, died about 1817 near Bremen, Ohio, married date and place unknown Jean McEwen born date and place unknown, died Waterford, Pennsylvania prior to 1813.

Samuel Work came to America prior to the Revolution and settled in Delaware. He served in Capt. Walter Carson's Company of the 2nd Battalion of Delaware Militia entering service December 18, 1776. About 1792 the family removed to Mifflin, Pennsylvania, and later to Waterford, Pennsylvania. About 1813 Samuel Work and his son Aaron removed to Rush Creek Township, Fairfield County, Ohio, near the Town of Bremen, where they took up 160 acres of land.

Samuel Work and Jean McEwen had several children, of whom one was Aaron.

(401) Aaron Work born April 9, 1778, in Chester County, Pennsylvania, the son of Samuel Work and Jean McEwen, died January 13, 1858 in Fairfield County, Ohio, married March 17, 1814, place unknown, Millicent Everett born June 29, 1791, place unknown, died May 9, 1875 in Fairfield County, Ohio. She was the daughter of Abel Everett and Bridget McMurtry. Aaron Work was a farmer, a Justice of the Peace, and a Ruling Elder of the Presbyterian Church. Aaron Work and Millicent Everett had nine children, of whom the fifth born was James Meter Work.

(402) James Meter Work, son of Aaron Work and Millicent Everett, born Fairfield County, Ohio January 25, 1825, died Fairfield County, Ohio November 5, 1899, married (1) date unknown probably in Ohio Mary Ann Lott, daughter of Peter M.

Lott and Catherine Sherwood, who died some time between 1860 and 1867 probably in Fairfield County, Ohio. He married (2) date unknown probably Ohio, Dorcas Meteer. James Meteer Work was a farmer and a Justice of the Peace. He and his first wife, Mary Ann Lott, had five children, of whom the fourth was James Milligan.

(403) James Milligan Work, son of James Meteer Work and Mary Ann Lott, born May 28, 1859 near Bremen, Ohio, died February 10, 1929 at Oxford, Ohio, married June 2, 1893 at Ludlow, Kentucky Alice Helen Closson, daughter of Asa Burton Closson and Julia Bancroft Payne, born July 20, 1873 at Ludlow, Kentucky, died April 12, 1965 at St. Petersburg Beach, Florida.

James Milligan Work was a minister of the Presbyterian Church, having graduated from Muskingum College in 1886 and from Lane Theological Seminary, Cincinnati, Ohio in 1889. He served pastorates in Ludlow, Kentucky, Cincinnati, Ohio, Plain City, Ohio, Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, and Millville, Ohio. James Milligan Work and his wife Alice Helen Closson had eleven children, of whom one was Walter Paxton.

(404) Walter Paxton Work was born in Oxford, Ohio September 4, 1909. He married July 29, 1939 at Covington, Kentucky Alice Tyler, daughter of Charles James Tyler and Ellen O'Rourke born October 23, 1912 Ft. Wayne, Indiana. Walter Paxton Work is an otolaryngologist, having graduated from the University of Michigan Medical School. He practiced in San Francisco, California and later returned to Ann Arbor, Michigan to head the Otolaryngology Department of the University of Michigan Medical School. Walter Paxton Work and Alice Tyler had four children: Walter Paxton, Jr. (See No. 76 on Page 20), James, Mary Alice, and Martha.

(450) James Watson born place unknown about 1753, died Skaneateles, New York November 27, 1820, interred Mottville Cemetery north of Skaneateles, grave stone legible, married date and place unknown Mary (McCabe ?) born place unknown about 1761, died August 21, 1848, Skaneateles, New York, interred Mottville Cemetery, stone legible.

James Watson was a veteran of the Revolution, having served in the 13th Regiment of the Albany County Militia, Col. Cornelius Van Veghten commanding, also in the 3rd Regiment of the Albany County Militia. He took up land near Skaneateles, Onondaga County in 1796. This was probably part of the militia tract reserved for New York veterans of the Revolution. James Watson is listed in the 1800 census of the Town of Marcellus, from which Skaneateles was taken in 1830.

James Watson and Mary (McCabe ?) had the following children, the places of their birth are unknown: Anna, Robert, John, Jane born October 16, 1785, married Peter Van Alstine (see No. 279, Appendix G), Daniel born 1788, James M., Isaac, Mollie, Richard B., Rufus born about 1798, Lovina, and Norman.

(451) Rufus Watson, son of James Watson and Mary (McCabe ?), born probably Skaneateles about 1798, died probably Skaneateles May 15, 1869, married about 1820 probably Skaneateles Elizabeth Shepard, daughter of Eliphalet Hull Shepard and Catherine Duncombe born Newtown, Connecticut October 5, 1802, died Skaneateles, New York May 26, 1845, interred Shepard Settlement Cemetery. Rufus Watson and son Orson are listed in the 1850 census. Rufus Watson and Elizabeth Shepard had the following

children all born Skaneateles: Loverdo born about 1823, Emily born about 1825 died young, R(ufus?) Hull born about 1828, Orson born about 1831, Ira born about 1832 died young.

(452) Orson Watson, son of Rufus Watson and Elizabeth Shepard, born about 1831 Skaneateles, New York, died Salem, Wisconsin September 25, 1860, married Salem, Wisconsin September 15, 1858 Margaret A. Van Alstine, daughter of James Watt Van Alstine and Joanna Carpenter born New York State about 1835, died Salem, Wisconsin. Orson Watson and Margaret A. Van Alstine had one child, Orson Hull.

(453) Orson Hull Watson born Salem, Wisconsin December 7, 1860.

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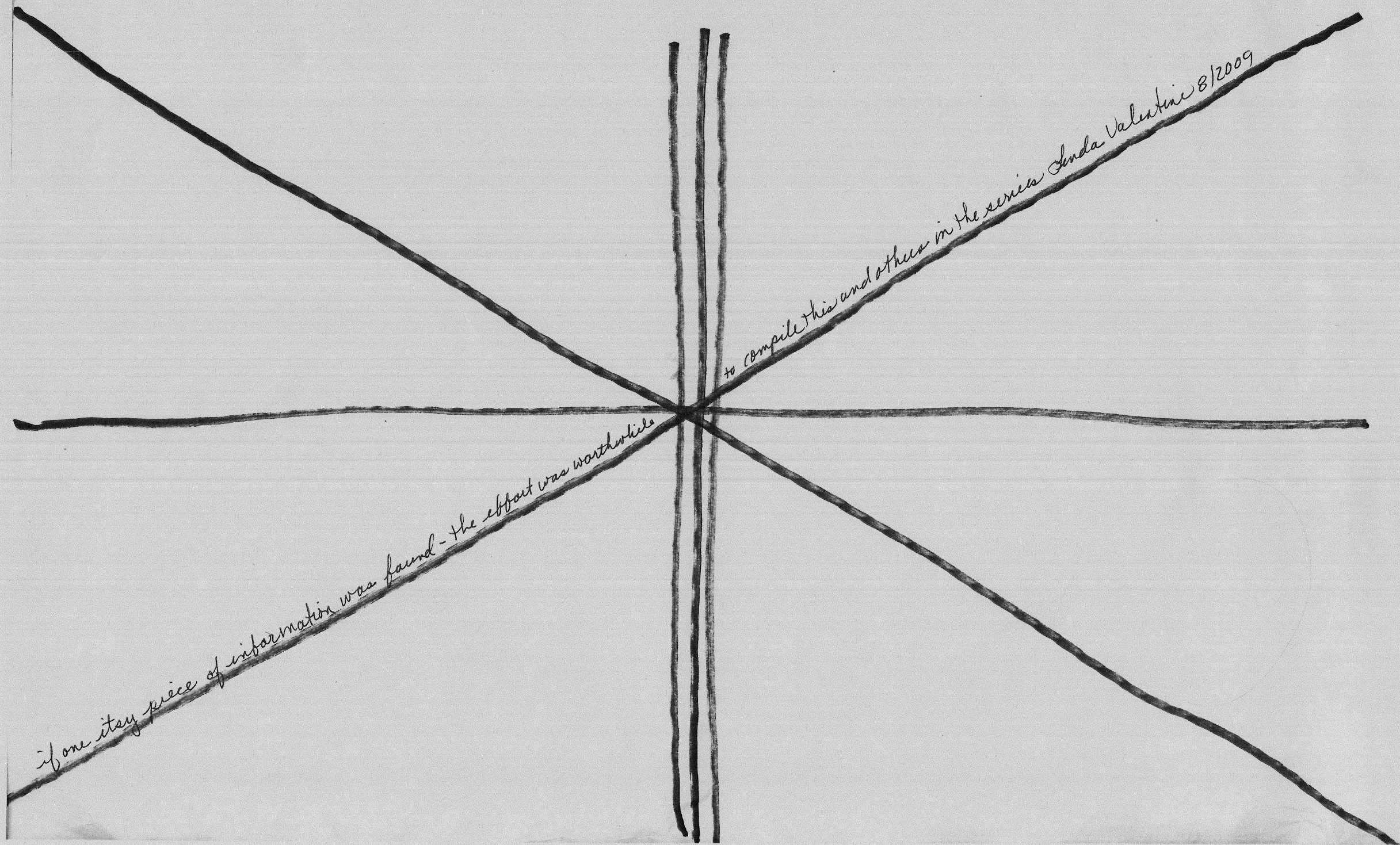
