This is a collection of Seeds of Wheatland which is a student paper reflecting activities each quarter in the year. The first issue each year basically is published in October. This is a nice collective showing the growth of the students, their names, names of teachers and events that they participated in. It was a School-wide paper to show pride of place and student to the parents. It did include some political material and included material regarding the consolidation efforts. Wonderful history.

FOR THIS COLLECTIVE, We chose to separate the booklets by the CALENDAR year, not the volumes. This does force the booklets to bridge different school years. Researchers should understand this.

In 1956, the numbering reflected Volume 3 which indicates that SEEDS started at least in 1953-1954.

The pages are not numbered as additional issues may be found and included in addendums

Please notice that because of the volume, auto feed was used and some of the lower portions of the page were truncated. A decision was made to reduce the handing of the originals and this slight truncation was the the result. . Originals are at the Wheatland Center School Library if the information is required. Each page has been numbered with the Volume and Issue number.

At the original processing, NO Volume 1 (1953), 2 (1954) or 5 (1957) was found.

Attached to some SEEDS are additional materials that the school felt were important to send to the parents.

The first issues were done as mimeographed 8.5x11 pages, single sided, white paper. Later, 8.5x14" double sided were used on random colored sheets.

WHEATLAND CENTER SCHOOL OPENS WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT

With the opening of school on Tuesday, September 5, a record enrollment of 225 students entered. With the close of school last May, average daily attendance was about 205, or above the 200 mark.

Record enrollments were established in Grades 3, 5, and 7 with well over 30 pupils in each of these grades. Grade 5, with 35 pupils holds the record for being the largest class. Grade 6 with 20 pupils has the least enrollment. However, this is offset by the fact that Mr. Nelson, the teacher of Grade 6, has accepted several teaching groups from Grade 5 to ease the problem of effective teaching due to heavy enrollment.

Faculty Replacements

New teachers on the faculty include Miss Robin Young in Grade 4. She succeeds Mrs. Floeter who is teaching in the second grade in Riverview School at Silver Lake. Mrs. Lasco is now teaching Grade 3 which was vacated by Mrs. Loretta Fox who went to join her husband in Oklahoma where he is stationed with the armed forces. Accepting the group in 5th Grade is Mrs. Laura Kuchenbach of Cedar Park, Burlington.

All three of these new teachers are graduates of the Kenosha-Racine County Normal with Miss Young being a graduate of Wheatland Center as well as having done some of her cadet teaching here. Mrs. Nancy Bird, who taught Grade 5 last year, is now teaching in Racine.

Among the special teachers, Mr. Henry Sirkman has assumed the responsibility of our music instruction. Mr. Sirkman will give individual and group lessons on Monday morning and vocal classroom music on Tuesday. He serves a group of schools in the area on a half-day basis each. Mr. Attoe in Physical Education and Miss Secanky in Art again round out the staff of teachers in the special subjects.

Magazine Sales Completed

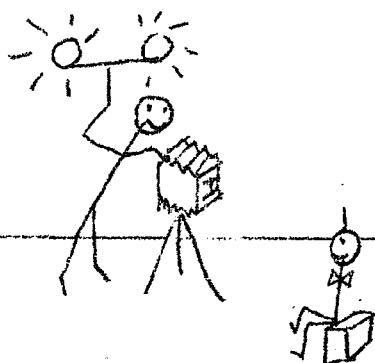

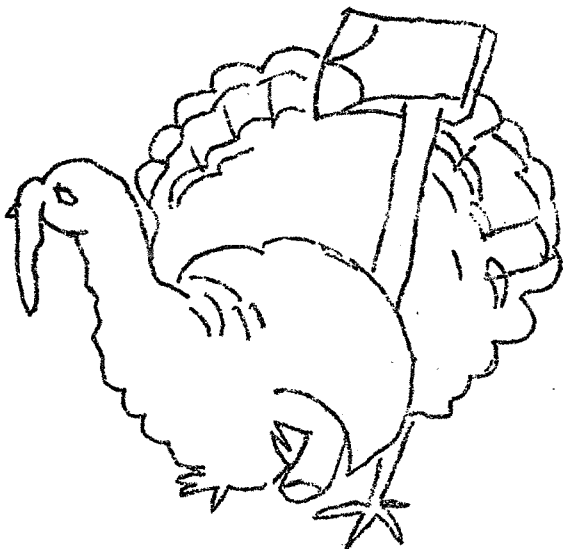

WHEATLAND CENTER SCHOOL ADOPTS STORM POLICY

If it becomes necessary to close the school because of a violent snow-storm or extreme cold such as we have had in our district, parents are to turn on their radios to Kenosha station WHIP, 1050, where the school closing will be reported from 7:15 a.m. and at intervals thereafter. Also, at times, the information will also be available on WTMJ.

Although this information would be available from Mr. Floeter or the school, it is advised that you try the radio station because of the tremendous amount of possible calls to the school. This also applies to the homes of the bus drivers.

School and County Attendance Policies

Every teacher has the responsibility of knowing WHY each absentee is not in school. If necessary a home call should be made by nurse or teacher to determine the cause of absence, and an attempt made to eliminate the cause, with the parents' cooperation, if the absence continues. If the absence continues, the principal sends a series of three letters with county approval, at stated intervals before legal action is taken to end the truancy.

Since it is necessary for every teacher to report weekly on all absences of every child to the County Supt., a written excuse from the parent or guardian giving the cause of each absence is needed. Illness should be the only cause for absence 99% of the time. If illness continues beyond 3 days, a physician's statement can be required. It is not the purpose of school attendance regulations to encourage attendance if the child is suffering from a communicable disease, including colds or infections.

Wheatland Center is indeed fortunate to have the cooperation of conscientious parents on this most of the time.

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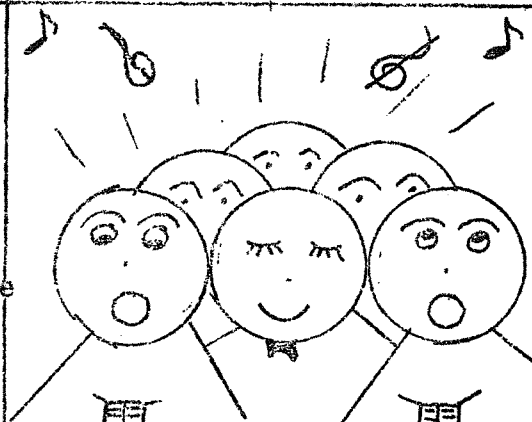

PROGRESS ON THE BUILDING ADDITION

We have been extremely fortunate to be building this fall. Very few days have been lost because of inclement weather. Sherrer Construction, Kaelber Plumbing and Heating, and Lakes Industries (Electrical) have cooperated to be able to have most of the underground work complete. All footings are in and most of the wall block work is done. Mr. Harlan Frahm, block layer from Burlington says that all remaining block work will be done in about four working days.

All door frames are doors will be of steel construction. Chief reasons are lower costs, faster construction, and lower maintenance costs. We have about a week of delays and inconveniences while they were being fabricated.

The roof structure is being manufactured and is arriving as rapidly as readiness to install. The roof structure is a Weiler-Span Roof Structure. This consists of an inverted "T" spaced for filler blocks over which are two inches of poured concrete and a five ply Built-up roof. All underground plumbing is installed drains from kitchen, classrooms, showers, toilets, and kindergarten; hot and cold water lines underground or in walls, and drain to new septic tank.

Kerkman Brothers installed a new 14,000 gallon concrete septic tank, and connections have been made to it. Donald Schmidt has started installing the seepage bed, but cold weather will hinder this project. Both of these contractors had submitted bids with the general contractors at the bid opening.

IMMUNIZATION CLINICS TO BE HELD SOON

A Polio Immunization Clinic sponsored by the Kenosha County Medical Society will be held at Wheatland Center School on Sunday, March 31, and Sunday, May 19, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

It will be remembered that similar protection was offered to Racine County residents last fall when Kenosha County postponed their clinics until this spring.

The first two doses, of a series of three, will consist of the Types I and II of the Sabin Oral Vaccine. It is customary that a drop of vaccine is placed on a sugar cube preferably for small children, or in a small paper cup and is taken by mouth rather than a "shot" by needle--the whole process taking only a few seconds time.

The annual county immunization clinic in which the program set up to administer the initial shots of the whooping cough-diphtheria-tetanus and booster shots will be held on March 8, April 5, and May 10 from 9:30-10:30 a.m. at Randall Consolidated School.

Although immunization is available to all it is encouraged for pre-school 4-5 year old children and babies. In the grades, the county has selected grades 3-7-10 to establish a pattern of time with a sequence of a 4 year interval. Although most 7th graders have had this protection parents of 8th graders would do well to check to be sure their children have had this protection before leaving elementary school. Smallpox vaccination is also available.

Bus transportation will be provided from Wheatland to Randall on clinic days and it should be especially noted that both clinics are available to everybody in the community.

Dear Parents:

Every child should be immunized against preventable diseases. Please check your health records or consult your physician regarding protection that your children may need.

The following clinical services are provided by this office with the support and participation of the Kenosha Co. Medical Society, County Superintendent of Schools and school personnel. Whether or not you wish your children to attend the clinics, please fill out and sign attached request form and return it to school promptly. Thank you.

CHILDREN 3 MONTHS THROUGH 5 YEARS OF AGE

Initial Series D.P.T. (whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus) Three successive clinics must be attended: Injections are given at month intervals for complete protection.

First Booster D.P.T. One injection D.P.T. is recommended one year after completion of the initial series of three injections.

Second Booster D.P.T. One injection D.P.T. is recommended before children enter school.

Smallpox Vaccination. Smallpox vaccinations will be offered at the first and second clinics to children 6 months and over who have never been vaccinated.

CHILDREN IN GRADES 3, 7 and 10

Initial Series D.T....(diphtheria and tetanus) Three successive clinics must be attended: Injections are given at month intervals for complete protection.

Booster D.T..... One injection D.T. is recommended every three years.

Smallpox Vaccination..For children who have never been vaccinated, or who have not been vaccinated within 5 or more years.

NOTE

No child may receive protection without having a signed parental request form with him.

Small children should be accompanied by their parents.

All children should wear clothes with loose sleeves.

Transportation should be provided or arranged for; remember there are some children who may have none.

On Wednesday, September 25, the individual pictures of all pupils will be taken in our school gym. There is no charge or obligation for this either to the school or parents. All pupils should be neatly dressed, looking their best. Generally colored clothing will photograph best.

NEW PHYSICAL EDUCATION EQUIPMENT

Wheatland Center School is very fortunate to have the facilities for locker rooms and showers this year. At the present time, our lockers get on limited use because the combination locks have not arrived. However they are supposed to be here Friday. After the locks arrive, each child (grades 5-8) will be expected to buy a lock.

At the end of the year, the school will buy the lock back if the child no longer needs or wants it. If the child returns to Wheatland next year he will be able to use the lock again. The price per lock is \$1.50. It is a master keyed lock thus permitting the physical education instructor the check cleanliness of equipment and clothing.

Boys and girls in the seventh and eighth grade will be required to wear gym suits to their physical education classes. We recommend that fifth and sixth graders also have gym suits. Each student will have a basket with a lock to keep his gym clothing in. All gym clothing must be taken home after each week of use. The school is purchasing gym suits for boys and girls. The school will in turn sell the suits. Approximate price: Girls gym suits \$3.60 Boys gym suits \$2.00. If a child already has a gym outfit, it most likely will be acceptable. Gym suits used later in high school may be acceptable. We plan to set up a system by which students may sell or buy used suits, thus one cash outlay may be enough for grade school.

GRADE 4

Dear Parents:

Many of you have written to me inquiring about homework for the children.

The state recommends that 4th graders spend $\frac{1}{2}$ hour per day on homework. The children are allowed to take their spelling home and will be able to take their geography home when we start using the text. It is often difficult to complete the assigned reading during school. Each child should acquaint himself with newspapers and magazines. The bringing of one clipping to school each Friday is required. Papers are available at school. 12 book report are required over the year; one every three weeks. They should be approximately one page long. Books from home may be used if they are brought to school and are acceptable.

I urge parents to help their children with arithmetic flash cards. We are now starting multiplication and division. Many children are still having trouble with addition and subtraction. Since these are the basis of arithmetic, a child could easily fall behind if he failed to learn these. The only way to do so is by drill and hard work.

Each child has $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours of study time in the morning, as we have 3 reading classes and 2 arithmetic classes of $\frac{1}{2}$ hr. each. I also try to give 10 to 15 minutes of study time for afternoon classes. If a child is making full use of his time, he should be able to complete all of his daily work in school. Makeup work will be allowed in case of illness.

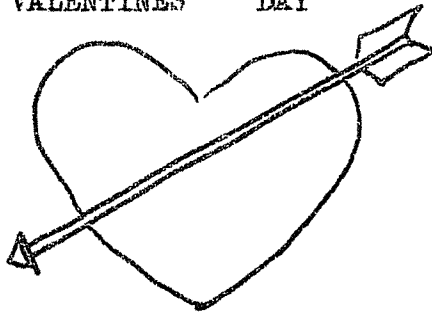
Since there are church services during Lent on Thursday night this year, we have re-scheduled our program to Tuesday, Feb. 18.

WHEATLAND CENTER SCHOOL PURCHASES NEW BUSES

The increased enrollment at our school has required an increased number of trips and some duplicate driving. We are still using two Ford buses that we purchased eleven years ago. Both were large 48 passenger buses in which we moved the seats closer together to make a 54 passenger bus. When a

load of more upper grade students in on, the 24 in. seat spacing is quite crowded. Our other buses have 27" spacing for grade school. Both buses are mechanically safe and pass inspections, repairs are more costly now.

Each budget has money to be raised to replace buses. At the end of June, 1963, \$7,855.50 was in this fund. The new 66 passenger International Ward body bus will cost \$6,331.00. With the balance and money from this year's budget, we should have \$5346.00 remaining in this fund in June 1964. No additional taxes need to be raised for the bus.

SEED SALE

Our annual school seed sale will be underway in a few days. A full box of seeds sell for \$1.50. It has 15 packets of seeds which may also be sold at 10¢ each. A special package valued at 25¢ may be kept or sold by the student for himself if sell over half of the box of seeds. The School's commission of 10¢ is used for the purchase of school athletic equipment. Grades 3 through 6 will sponsor the sale this year. If you wish some seeds, please request them from the school or one of the students from these grades.

OFFICE MEMORANDUM

We launch another school year at Wheatland Center with a record enrollment of 310 in Wheatland Center plus 4 receiving special help at Badcock Lake, 1 at the school for the deaf at Delevan, and 4 students are enrolling within a few days. At the end of last year we had 208 in school. This increase represents another classroom of students.

At present all rooms in the school are in use for 100% of the time with the exception of the math-music room being free on three afternoons and the library-art room having a few periods of limited use. To give extra help to the eighth grade it is divided mornings into two groups. Our second and third grades are also near or over 40 students so therefore are divided to be able to give additional help. Our first grade level has 37 students. We are working on this problem and hope to be able to arrange additional instruction.

This will require some grouping and shifting of space for library, art or music. If our district continues to grow, undoubtedly we will need face another building.

We were appreciative of the large turn out for the annual meeting. Many issues were discussed and explained. To keep the enrollment fee at a limited amount, it was to include W.L.A.A. insurance, and room fees only. Art fees and towel service for all would have added about \$4.00 each per student.

Although we were hoping to keep this fee at \$2.00, the increase in our insurance per student to \$1.45 prompted us to increase the enrollment fee to \$2.50. It was our opinion that it was better to do this rather than to ask for contributions during the year.

Around the Classes

The 8th grade in Reading will have as their text, Journeys Into America, which will prepare them for their unit in American Literature for the fourth quarter. They began the year with a discussion of literature and its various forms. The 8th grade is divided into two groups 8A and 8B this year with 11 students in the 8B group. The entire 8th grade will study literature but will use different books.

In 8th grade 9 students are in a new book in Math called Exploring Modern Mathematics, Book 2. They are studying a system of integers. The remaining 8th graders are studying different bases and reviewing the basic operations of Math.

 - b. More than eight (8) Physical Therapy treatments for any one injury. This shall include Manipulative Therapy.
 - c. Injuries resulting from epilepsy, fits, convulsions, diabetes, any congenital weakness, constitutional disease or pre-existent conditions if any of the same contribute to produce such an injury.
 - d. Loss caused by or as the result of bacterial infection or any other kind of disease, or medical or surgical treatment of it (except pyogenic infections caused by accidental injury otherwise covered under this Program.)
 - e. Injuries resulting from war, insurrection, or riot.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

The following regulations apply:

1. Payments for Benefit requests will be authorized only when the medical and surgical aid is rendered by a licensed physician, that is, a doctor of medicine and surgery or a doctor of osteopathy and surgery, and/or a licensed dentist.
2. First treatment must be given within 21 days of the date of injury in order for a claim to qualify. If treatment is not rendered within 21 days of the date of injury, it is necessary to submit a written statement along with the claim clarifying the circumstances which prevented treatment from being administered within the 21 day time requirement. The entire claim will then be subject to review by the Executive Committee and the Medical and/or Dental Advisor.
3. It is not necessary to file written notice of injury within a specified time limit or to request an extension after a certain period of time. Schools, which will be provided with Proof of Loss forms, have up to one year from the date of injury to report, complete and file all claims. All claims must be submitted no later than one year from the date of injury (even if it has not been completed) if consideration is to be granted. Extenuating circumstances may qualify for payment treatment rendered within one year from the date of injury without the filing of the claim within the one year period but no consideration can be given for treatment rendered after one year from date of injury.
4. Payments for consultation and referral services will be authorized only when requested by the original physician or dentist and so indicated in his statement.
5. A claim is closed if the indemnity check for the claim has been presented for payment. However, written evidence of extenuating circumstances from both the school and the attending physician may qualify additional treatment for consideration upon the approval of the Executive Committee and the Medical and/or Dental Advisor.
6. Benefit payment for loss of life of a covered student or for other specific total loss is payable to the parents. All other indemnities of the program are payable to the person or institution rendering the service.
7. Matters of arbitration will be considered by the Plan's Executive Committee Control and the State Medical Society's Advisory Committee. The attending physician's records and x-ray plates as they pertain to the Benefit Request in question shall be available to the arbitration committee.
8. The Executive Committee reserves the right to ask for evidence beyond that originally submitted when the Medical Advisor and the Executive Committee deem such evidence desirable or necessary to establish the validity of the claim.

PUPIL COVERAGE

of the

SPECIAL PROGRAM

FOR THE 1964-65 SCHOOL YEAR

You as a parent should be aware of these important points about this coverage:

Your child is protected while he is engaged in any type of activity which is sponsored, controlled, supervised and directed by the school, BUT your child is not protected while engaging in interscholastic athletic practice or competition and your child is not protected while traveling to and from school even though such travel may be via school bus.

If a claim on behalf of your child exceeds \$50, you will be asked about medical expense insurance which you also may carry and which also may be collectible on the same injury. Our payment will be adjusted in the event you also collect from another carrier as explained in this folder.

REMEMBER! You cannot receive consideration for treatment by a second doctor UNLESS the first doctor authorizes such treatment.

DO NOT communicate with the Benefit Plan offices except on matters dealing with other collectible medical expense insurance. Communicate with your school principal or with the person designated by the school. If this person cannot give you necessary answers, he will get the answers for you.

SPECIAL BENEFIT PROGRAM

Objective

The purpose of this Program is to pay the cost of reasonable and necessary hospital and medical expenses incurred as a result of an accidental injury sustained by students while participating in school sponsored activities (except interscholastic athletics).

No Health Coverage

This Program does not provide Health Coverage and no payments can be made for treatment which is not the direct result of an accident.

Definitions

For the purpose of this Program, the following definitions will be used:

- 1. PLAN shall mean the WIAA Accident Benefit Plan.
- 2. PROGRAM shall mean the Special Program.
- 3. STUDENT shall mean a pupil who is entitled to benefits through attending a school enrolled under this Program.
- 4. INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS shall mean scheduled sports competition between schools, including competition between schools of the same school system.
 - a. Competition within a school is intramural.
 - b. No sports activity below the 7th grade shall be considered interscholastic.
- 5. MEDICAL EXPENSE INSURANCE shall mean coverage by others under which benefits are payable to the student for an injury which is also covered under this Program.
 - a. This will include personal accident and health policies, medical payment plans, etc.
 - b. Third party liability insurance shall not be considered medical expense insurance for the purpose of this Program.

PUPIL COVERAGE

Subject to the provisions and limitations of this Program, this division will provide coverage for accidental injuries sustained by a student while participating in school sponsored activities. This will include intramural athletics and physical education but not interscholastic athletics.

This Program is not available on an individual basis.

Coverage

Subject to the provisions and limitations of the Program, benefits are provided for students of participating schools for necessary medical, dental, or hospital expense resulting directly from accidental bodily injury sustained while:

- a. Attending school during the hours and days when school is in session; or
- b. Representing a school in a scheduled activity as a participant or spectator when the group is under the direction, control, and supervision of his school or other properly designated individual.

The period of coverage shall be for the school year, and shall terminate on the last attendance day.

This Program will not provide coverage for injuries sustained in practice for, or participation in, interscholastic athletics.

SUMMER ACTIVITY COVERAGE

Subject to the provisions and limitations of this Program, this division will provide coverage for accidental injuries sustained by a boy or girl while participating in a school summer sports program or other type of school summer program.

Coverage

Subject to the provisions and limitations of the Program, benefits are provided for covered participants for necessary and incurred medical, dental or hospital service resulting directly from accidental bodily injuries sustained while a student is participating in and/or attending activities which are sponsored and supervised as part of the approved program.

Coverage is effective for the duration of the approved activity which may not begin before the closing date of school in the spring or continue after the opening date of school in the fall. A high school program, which starts prior to the end of the school year and continues into the summer may be covered under this Program upon special approval by the Executive Committee.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

The following provisions shall apply except where specifically noted.

Benefit Allowances and Limitations of Liability

If a student sustains an accidental injury covered by this Program, the Plan will pay an amount not exceeding \$2,000 for any one accident for necessary expenses incurred for treatment by a legally qualified physician or surgeon, dental treatment for natural or restored teeth, hospital care or services, or the employment of a registered graduate nurse (excepting that for injury to one or more sound natural or restored teeth the payment shall not exceed \$125); and provided that such expense begins within 3 weeks of the date of accident and is incurred within 52 weeks from the date of accident.

The preceding paragraph shall be subject to the following provisions and limitations:

1. If the necessary and incurred expenses covered under this Program shall exceed \$50, and if all or part of such incurred expense is covered by valid and collectible medical expense insurance, then the Plan will pay the unpaid balance (up to \$2,000) or \$50 whichever is the greater.
2. And provided further, that should the student by reason of a covered injury sustain one of the following specific total losses within 52 weeks from the date of accident, the Plan will pay in addition to other allowances:

- Only one of the above amounts may be elected for any combination of losses. With regard to hands and feet total loss shall mean actual severance through or above the wrist or ankle joint; with regard to eyes, entire and irrecoverable loss of sight.
3. And provided further the maximum aggregate liability of the Plan, on account of all injuries and deaths sustained in and arising out of any one accident, shall not exceed \$20,000.00.
- a. In case the aggregate loss sustained by covered students shall exceed \$20,000.00, the said \$20,000 shall be prorated among the several persons entitled to it.
 - b. The aggregate loss of covered students shall be the sum of:
 - (1) All expenses, otherwise covered under this Program, sustained by students for which there is no collectible medical expense insurance; and
 - (2) Any unpaid balance of expenses, otherwise covered under this plan, after collectible medical expense insurance benefits have been paid, or are payable to, on behalf of covered students; and
 - (3) Any amounts paid for specified total losses as set out in paragraph 2 above.

ARITHMETIC

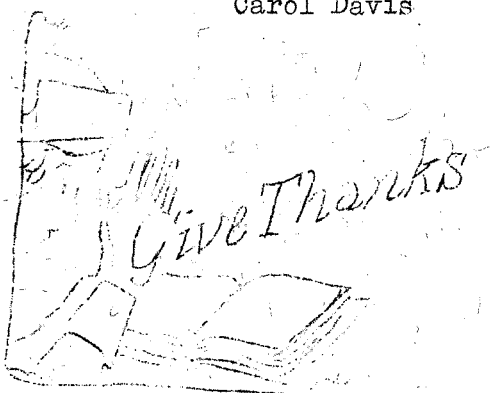
In arithmetic we are studying about exponents and bases. We have had a test on bases. We're working in base ten, base eight, base six, and base five mostly.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS WITH TOWN RECREATION COMMITTEE

At a recent meeting policies for the use of the school gym were discussed and set up. The school board has always felt that the school facilities were built to serve the best interests of our school district. They are highly appreciative of the cooperation from our two fine 4H Clubs, the Mothers' Club and Sportsmen's Club. Our community should recognize the efforts of their leaders in instructing, supervising, and furnishing recreation for these groups. The chief problem with youth groups has been to remind them that playing games in the gym with marking shoes is prohibited.

The Town Recreation Committee, Wm. Uhen, Henry Kretschmer, Larry Smith, and Richard Luke, have offered to assist with the scheduling of practices and supervision. Some board members and others will be assisting as needed.

It was generally agreed to open the building from one to four o'clock on Sunday afternoons for younger and older boys' practice. Other games or gym uses must be made through a supervisor or school principal.

Accepted policies are:

1. A reasonably sized group must be registered with a supervisor. (1 to 5 may not be accepted)
2. Arrangements must be made prior to time of gym use. Supervisors will make such arrangements.
3. A limited school building use

(Gym and boy's washroom next to lobby and entrance lobby) Entrance door used only.

4. No smoking on school property.
5. Practices are for members of school district only or by special invitation of supervisor.
6. Supervisor has right to limit the size of the group or exclude any individual not following policies set up.
7. Non-marking shoes for gym use only are required.
8. Time limits will be set by supervisor.
9. The school board or school district accepts no responsibility for accidents.
10. Damage to building or equipment must be reported to a school official.
11. Necessary equipment will be furnished on request.
12. Additional rules necessary for recreational activities may be set up by supervisor.

SCHOOL INTEGRATION STUDIES

What is an intergrated district?

In Wisconsin an intergrated district is one what operates a public school system by one school board and on administration in one or more buildings for grades from kindergarten or grade one through grade twelve. Wisconsin has never

divided its public school students on the basic of race, color, or religion; therefore, we do not need to integrate in the same way as some southern state areas.

Is an intergrated district in Wisconsin relatively new?

No, intergrated districts in Wisconsin have existed for over 100 years in some areas. Most villages and cities operated a system of K-12 or 1-12.

Has the elementary district of Wheatland Center ever been a part of an intergrated district?

No, this area has always operated elementary schools only. We have consolidated into one school system from seven one room school systems (Slades Corners, Oak Dale, Fox River, High Street, New Munster, Wheatland, and Mound S Center).

Where had Wheatland Center area students received their high school education?

Most one room school students from this area attended either Wilnot or Burlington High School before Central High School was organized in 1952. Some attended Lake Geneva, Genoa City, or other nearby high schools.

Who paid this cost of high school education for our area?

Before about 1925 this tuition cost was paid directly by parents. From then until union high districts were organized, this tuition cost was paid by town governments to the high school districts.

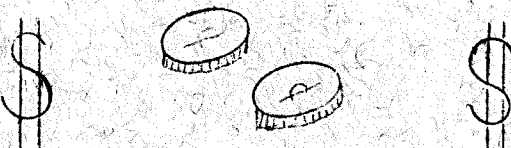

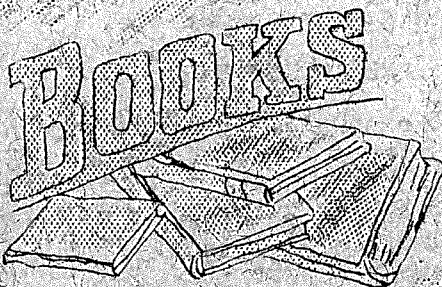

Why were union high school districts formed?

The state of Wisconsin at one time had over 7000 school districts. As population shifted, several of these districts decided it was cheaper to close its school and transport the students to a neighboring school on a tuition basis. Many of these non-operating districts have been required by law to consolidate with another district. Law also required all area to be in a high school district. To make this possible large high school districts were formed. Some intergrated districts as Wilmot, Burlington, Lake Geneva, Union Grove, etc. reorganized by having one elementary district the same as the village or city area and a large union high school district including all other neighboring area. Some new union high school districts were formed as Central High School. The Somers-Pleasant Prairie area formed a non operating union high school district. Law now requires that they be in a district which operates a high school. They will be voting in about a week whether or not to bond their district to build a new high school building. Have you been following the on and off mud slinging-caressing between the city of Kenosha and its neighbor to the west? Will they consolidate or stay as two districts?

Mrs. Grace Hertlein, our art teacher for the past 3 years has joined the Peace Corps.

Miss Carol Kelleher, our vocal-instrumental teacher, is planning to continue her education by getting her Master's degree at Madison.

Mrs. Barbara Becker will be busy contributing and joining the ranks of those responsible for population explosion in the U.S.

Mrs. Jeanette Paasch will be assuming full responsibility of the care of her two boys.

Mr. Warren Nelson, our sixth grade teacher and for the past two years our science teacher has decided to seek employment elsewhere.

Our district is indebted and appreciative of the extra efforts and services of these teachers. Best wishes to all.

The School Board has also rehired the balance of the faculty. In addition they have hired Miss Gail McNeil of Kenosha to teach in the primary grades, Miss Rosalie Hill of Genoa City to teach in the middle grades, Richard Pladies of Mukwonago to teach science and art, and Mr. Ed. Stevens from Salem to teach instrumental music $\frac{1}{2}$ day per week. We are still looking for a vocal music teacher.
